Awareness Of Swami Vivekananda Among Young Generation

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Abstract: -

This paper aimed at understanding the awareness of Swami Vivekananda among the young generation, do a comparative study of awareness on Swami Vivekananda between young and older generation and between boys and girls.

Introduction:

3. There is no relation between reading books on Swami Vivekananda with their gender.

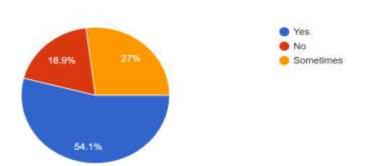
Methodology:

Primary data is collected using interview and questionnaire method.

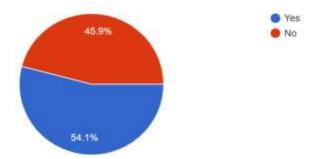
- 2. Sample size: 148

Analysis 1: Results of graphs

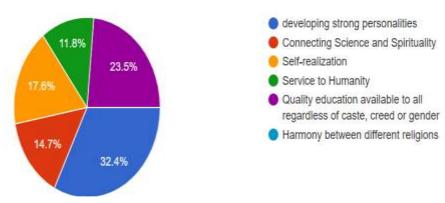

Graph 2: Percentage of respondents read books on Swami Vivekananda before: 54.1% people have read books on Swami Vivekananda.

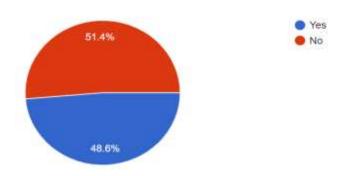


Graph 3: The philosophical ideas most appeals to the respondents:

Analysis 2: Results of chi square tests

1. Relation between familiarity with awareness on Swami Vivekananda with their gender.

Test 1: H0:- There is no Relation between familiarity with awareness on Swami Vivekananda with their gender.

H1:- Awareness on Swami Vivekananda depends with their gender

Test: Chi square test

Result: P value = 0.6828

Since P value > 0.05, so we do not <u>reject</u> the null hypothesis at 5% LOS. We conclude that, awareness on Swami Vivekananda does not depend on their gender.

In case we find that null hypothesis is rejected and find that a higher percentage of males or females are very familiar with Swami Vivekananda compared to females or males, then this could prompt further investigation into factors influencing awareness levels, such as cultural upbringing, educational background, or access to information.

2. Relation between familiarity with awareness on Swami Vivekananda with their age.

Test 2: H0:- There is no relation with the interest in learning more about Swami Vivekananda with their age.

H1:- The interest in learning more about Swami Vivekananda relates with their age.

Test: Chi square test Result: P value = 0.0074

Since P value < 0.05, so we reject the null hypothesis at 5% LOS. We conclude that, awareness on Swami Vivekananda depends on their age. This is because older generations are more aware of Swami Vivekananda as they have studied in books, many of them have studies in their school History books, attended some lectures on Swami Vivekananda or gathered knowledge from their parents or grandparents.

Nowadays school curriculum does not include teachings and philosophy of Swami Vivekananda, so young generation may not be aware on Swamiji. The other reasons of lack of knowledge may be due to young generation are too much occupied with social media, and they don't have time to read any good knowledge enhancing books, parents are so occupied in regular work that young generation don't have any mentors or role models who will guide them on Swamiji's teachings and philosophies. The other reason may be: Changes in societal norms and values over time can influence the interests and priorities of younger generations. As cultural attitudes evolve, the appeal of historical figures like Swami Vivekananda may diminish for some individuals.

3. Relation between reading books on Swami Vivekananda with their gender.

Test 3: H0:- There is no significant differences in the likelihood of reading books on Swami Vivekananda between different genders.

H1:- There is significant differences in the likelihood of reading books on Swami Vivekananda between different genders.

Test: Chi square test

Result: P value = p-value = 0.07971

Since P value > 0.05, so we do not <u>reject</u> the null hypothesis at 5% LOS.

We conclude that, there is no significant differences in the likelihood of reading books on Swami Vivekananda between different genders.

In case we find that null hypothesis is rejected and find that a higher percentage of males or females read more books on Swami Vivekananda, then this could prompt further investigation into factors influencing reading levels, such as cultural upbringing, educational background, or access to literature.

4. Relation between reading books on Swami Vivekananda with their gender.

Test 4: H0:- There is no significant differences in the likelihood of reading books on Swami Vivekananda between different age groups.

H1:- There is significant differences in the likelihood of reading books on Swami Vivekananda between different age groups.

Test: Chi square test

Result: P value = p-value = 0.03079

Since P value < 0.05, so we <u>reject</u> the null hypothesis at 5% LOS..

We conclude that, there is significant differences in the likelihood of reading books on Swami Vivekananda between different age groups.

Conclusion:

In analysis, we found there is significant difference in Awareness and reading books on Swami Vivekananda age group wise and no significant difference when compared gender wise. This is because older generation have studied on him in school curriculum and must have developed interest from their parents and grandparents. There can be many reasons for which young generation are less aware on Swamiji's work and teachings.

- 1. Young generation do not study in their school curriculum.
- 2. Some young people may find Swami Vivekananda's teachings as outdated or irrelevant to their modern lives.
- 3. In today's digital age, young people are bombarded with information from various sources, including social media, entertainment, and news outlets. With so many competing interests and distractions, they may not prioritize learning about historical figures like Swami Vivekananda.
- If young people do not have positive role models or mentors who promote the teachings of Swami Vivekananda, they may not see the value in exploring his ideas further.

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
