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Summary

I mean the search to reach a contemporary design style depends on the technique of tents and embroidery fabric added to the implementation of headdresses for women in the style of designs developed from the sources of new design is to inspire its elements of modern art influenced by Islamic arts with no resort to Westernization has meant the research rooting the new design style through the implementation of 16 design models and then employ them with the appropriate fashion for them and then the use of scraps and remnants of fabrics ready-made garment factories in the implementation of a simple technical way depending on his grandfather And the modernity of the implemented designs, which supports the style of Khayamiya as a heritage style and its use in new purposes and functions.

The historical development of the art of tents:

Some researchers and analysts mention that the ancient Egyptian is the first to know tents in the era of building the pyramids, where it was used as an umbrella for the foreman, while the pharaoh was making a tent for him

For trips, Maspero mentioned in his book "Royal Mummies" that there is a crypt of leather discovered from the twenty-first dynasty, which is one of the rare pieces of art in the manner of addition (tents) found in the crypt of Deir el-Bahari, and we also find that some of the clothes of the pharaohs decorated with ribbons added by embroidery, such as the robe of Tutankhamun located in the ancient Egyptian Museum, and there is a group of tapes and belts engraved decorated in a manner tents, and on the chairs found in The tomb of Ramses III found "pillows - pillows" of cloth with decorations

It is also added with cloth and examples abound in ancient Egyptian history.

Tutankhamun's robe in the ancient Egyptian Museum, and there is a group of tapes and patterned belts decorated in the manner of tents, and on the chairs found in the tomb of Ramses III found "pillows - pillows" of cloth with decorations added with cloth as well and many examples in ancient Egyptian history.

The art of tents in the style of juxtaposition of materials (patches is intended to assemble a group of woven or non-woven materials or both together and put them on the floor flat in balance and complete composition and then installed stitches fixing visible, or invisible in an attempt to fill the space of the whole floor and rarely shows any part of it and the art of tents in this style is divided into several types, including:

- 1 The art of tents in the style of patches in the form of different spaces.
- 2- The art of tents in the style of patches with one space. The art of tents in the style of patchwork with small spaces is one.
- 3- The art of tents in the style of patches with geometric spaces

:The art of "Applique " tents

The study was exposed to the history of added fabric in the Islamic era and before and the manufacture of tents in Egypt currently and historically, as well as reviewed the decorations of the added fabric and the raw materials required for their implementation, and referred to the pendants that are currently implemented in the manner of tents and their aesthetic values .

The stages of synthesis of fabric residues, including two stages:

Family income

Historical background information:

1. Statistics on the living and working conditions of workers and their families were 1919 In this regard, several previous international conferences of labour statisticians have adopted

resolutions on household expenditure surveys and household income and expenditure surveys.

The resolutions adopted by the First International Conference of Labour Statisticians included the International Labour Office (1926) and the Seventh International Conference of Experts on Labour Statistics in 1949 (International Labour Office, 1951) and the Twelfth International Conference of Labour Statisticians in 1973 International Labour Office (2000). The latter resolution, which is still in force, addresses the objectives, frequency and scope of household income and expenditure surveys Organization of surveys Data collection units Basic concepts and definitions of income and consumer expenditure Basic methodology Classifications; Results.

2. In parallel to this work, the Office has also considered on several occasions the conduct of expenditure surveys.

In the context of its activity on consumer price indices and the resolutions adopted by the Second International Conference of Labour Statisticians (1925), the Sixth International Conference of Experts on Labour Statistics (1947), the Tenth International Conference of Labour Statisticians (1962) and the Fourteenth International Conference of Experts on Labour Statistics (1987), recognize the importance of household expenditure surveys in order to derive weights for the collection of consumer price indices.

The resolution of the Fourteenth Conference of Labour Statisticians recommends that such surveys represent, within available resources, household size, income level, regional location, socioeconomic group and any other factors that may be related to household expenditure patterns (ILO, 2000).

3. The Office has also produced a series of publications, including methodological specifications and results of national surveys related to family livelihood studies, family budget surveys and household income and expenditure surveys (ILO 1961a, ILO 1961b, ILO 2, ILO (1995)).

In addition to activities related to family livelihood studies and consumer price indices, there are also two resolutions on an integrated system of wage statistics and measurement of labour income, adopted respectively by the Twelfth International Conference of Labour Statisticians in 1973 and the Sixteenth International Conference of Experts on Labour Statistics in 1998 (International Labour Office, 2000).

Other international and regional agencies have been involved in their role in the development and promotion of standards in the area of household income and expenditure statistics as well as in supporting their application United Nations, 1964 United Nations Department of Technical Cooperation for Development (1989) In 1994, on behalf of the United Nations Statistics Division and some other organizations, the Statistical Office of the European Commission sponsored a work whose results were presented in a study entitled "Statistics of household income, consumption and savings distribution" (1998) all et Franz. This study was a revision of previously issued guidelines issued by the United Nations Statistics Division (United Nations (1977) and the European Union Statistical Office issued a handbook on household budget surveys (1997) HBS-E HBS EUROSTAT,

Draft Handbook on Income Surveys, Draft Statistical Office of the European Union Handbook on Income Measurement (2002) SILC-UE and World Bank Standards of Living Publication (2000).

A three-part guide on conducting multipurpose household surveys based on its experiences from measurement surveys Efforts have also been made at the national level in developing countries to develop a framework for the production of household income and expenditure statistics. For example, the Australian Bureau of Statistics published a "Provisional Framework for Household Income, Consumption, Savings and Wealth" as a conceptual design for the production of statistics related to household economic wellbeing (1995). There has also been some new work at the international level on standards in income statistics and the Canberra Group on Household Income Statistics has been issued.

Income concept and definition:

Household income consists of all income received by the household or household members, in cash, in kind, or services, annually or at earlier intervals, but excludes contingent profits and other such irregular and usually incidental incomes. Household income income is available for current consumption and, with the exception of income listed in paragraph 18 below, does not reduce the net assets of the household through the decrease of its cash

assets, the disposition of other financial or non-financial assets or the increase in its liabilities 50. In practice, household income can be determined by the expression

Among the most important previous studies in the field of tenting and recycling Assem Haya, El-Desouky, (2020) Title: Employing Robotic Knitted Scraps in Enriching Children's Jeans Clothing.

The aim of the study was:

Giving aesthetic and functional value to children's clothing by decorating it with cartoon characters from scraps of automatic knitted fabrics Shedding light on a new style of children's clothing decoration using scraps of automatic knitted fabrics and opening new areas for small and medium enterprises

The study found the following results:

There are statistically significant differences between the designs implemented in achieving the aesthetic aspect according to the opinions of the arbitrators

There are statistically significant differences between the designs implemented in achieving the innovative aspect according to the opinions of the arbitrators

There are statistically significant differences between the designs implemented in achieving the functional aspect according to the opinions of the arbitrators

El Gohary: 2006 (Title: The possibility of benefiting from the recycling of fabric residues to enrich women's outerwear).

The aim of the study was:

Shedding light on the recycling of leftover fabrics and benefiting from them in the preparation and implementation of Joulat that repair women's outerwear using the patchwork method

Which leads to the provision of innovative economic clothes, so the researchers produced a number (14) gonla and used a questionnaire form that includes five axes, which are the foundations of designing the functional aspect, the aesthetic aspect, the innovative side of the marketing aspect.

The study finds the following findings:

There is a difference between the tours in achieving the design foundations side, while there are no differences between the rounds in achieving both the functional aspect, the aesthetic aspect, the innovative side, the marketing side (and the presence of differences between the axes of the implemented geoles, so we find that they are in terms of preference in order The functional aspect, followed by the innovative, followed by the foundations of design, followed by the marketing aspect, and finally the aesthetic aspect.

Study by Muhammad Hind Al-Ani (2021) Title: Creativity in decorative fabric designs Supplements and furniture Interior Design Environment The study objective:

Study examples of designs of decorative fabrics used in furniture used within the internal environment of our time

The study finds the following findings:

Handling surfaces and blocks deliberately This is achieved when the designs are traditional, spontaneous and simple decorative fabrics

Al-Damanhouri, et al., 2021 (Title: Enriching the design reality on the mannequin using tent fabric to identify the orientation of female students towards sustainable development)

The aim of the study was:

Reveal more expressive and aesthetic features and values in the tent fabric by designing innovative aesthetic compositions of fashion through Formation with tent fabric in a modern way, to suit women from the age of 35 to 20 years The study found the following results: There are statistically significant differences between the responses of specialists to the designs implemented from tent fabrics, which indicates the possibility of enriching the design reality on the mannequin using tent fabric, and that the general level of students' tendency towards the use of tent fabrics is at an appropriate degree, i.e. a high level of approval for the use of tent fabric, by (93.45%)

Where designs can be implemented with a new vision for women's clothing in which aesthetic richness, ease of implementation, beauty of shape and low cost are achieved.

Mahmoud Iman Obaid: 2020 (Title An education strategy based on visual thinking to develop the skills of producing artistic works in the style of Khayamiya among art education students)

The study aimed at: to develop the technical skills for the production of artistic artifacts in the style of tents

The study found the following results:

There is a statistically significant difference between the students' results before the proposed strategy is applied and after its valid post-application.

Abdul Karim and others: 2020 (Title: Recycling the remnants of shearing factories ready-made garments to achieve sustainability).

The aim of the study is: to try to reach a more accurate yarn tiger by mixing chopped recycled cotton with polyester in varying proportions and producing melicia products that suit the functional purposes specified for them.

The study found the following results:

The possibility of benefiting from the exhaust of the clothing industry and recycling it to produce fabric yarns and usable clothes, as the savings rates in the total for tiger yarns and the mixing rates used ranged between 66% to 38%

Mohammed Safinaz Mohamed: 2020 (Title: Recycling Fixed Clothing Supplements and Employing Them to Enrich the Art of Jewelry)

The aim of the study: to recycle fixed clothing supplements (connected) and use them in the work of ornaments in an innovative way

The study found the following results:

The designs have been accepted aesthetically and innovatively, as well as functionally and economically.

And that the trend towards recycling contributes to the development of clothing fashion and supplements, and opens new doors to break the norm in the field of fashion, especially supplements.

Heikal et al.: 2022 (Title: The use of leftover evening wear fabrics in the work of separate clothing supplements The research aims):

Exploiting the remnants of evening wear fabrics in the design and implementation of new and innovative separate clothing supplements by following technical and scientific methods

Recycling the remnants of fabrics, especially evening wear fabrics, because of their beauty, luster, distinctive features, high prices and diversity in their materials, inspires the designer with new creative ideas

The research reached the following results:

The existence of statistically significant differences between the implemented designs in achieving the elements and foundations of the design according to the opinions of specialists.

Mustafa Thana Al-Sarhan: 2011((Title: Recycling of Fabric Residues for Use in Supplements. Furnishings)

The research aims:

How to exploit the remnants of fabrics and consumable parts to make other new products by following scientific methods The research reached the following results: Raising the awareness of women in the community of the importance of recycling and working in ready-made garment factories for recycling work to raise the level of extract

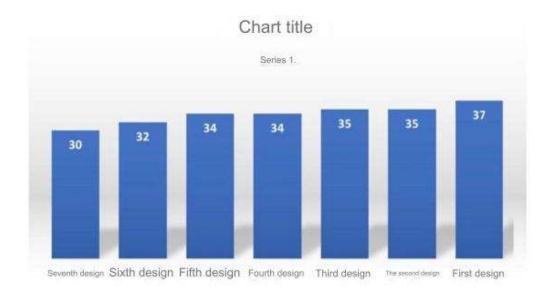


Figure (1) shows the quality factor for the degrees of the proposed designs in achieving the aspects (as a whole)
